## Warner Rail Trail

We are pleased to report the initial section of rail trail at Bagley Field in Warner is now operational. The Active Transportation Grant administered through HEAL-NH provided support during the earliest days of this project when it was only a grand vision for the town.

HEAL-NH and its funders should be very proud of their leadership role in this project which we hope transforms the town as it continues to grow.

The \$5,000 put in by the AT Grant was matched by \$2,000 in private donations, \$1,000 committed by Warner Parks and Recreation and a \$2,000 from the Nancy Sibley Wilkins Trust. In addition over 100 hours of volunteer time was spent on the project. This enabled us to clear brush, restore the grade, bring in stone dust and have it compacted. Work on this section continues with two gates to install and signage to put up, and a bit more surface smoothing to take place, but it is operational now and worthy of your personal inspection.

The improvements done to date begin at the Bagley Field Driveway and head southeast to the end of the property. Substantial clearing was done along the entire length with particular attention paid to the section of the trail affording a view to the soccer fields. We wanted to create both a great viewing venue for spectators and make it obvious to people on the playing fields that a trail now exists worthy of exploration.

The improved section is just over ½ mile in length with an additional more rustic 600' loop at the end which affords two more good views of the river. Getting this work done just in time for the beginning of the fall soccer season was important because this is the time of year when Bagley gets many visitors. Trail use and positive feedback has already started to come in.

Rona Bock said the trail was beautiful and her 6 year old granddaughter asked if she were in a tunnel because the raised canopy still covers the trail most of the way yet lets in sufficient light. A mother and young

daughter age 5 or 6 walked the trail while a sibling was at soccer practice. They both enjoyed the walk and the mom was impressed her daughter had done the entire trip down and back in good spirits. We are already seeing children bicycle the trail to see where it goes.

Parks and Recreation has taken on the trail as a project and provided substantial volunteer labor to make it happen. They have become truly inspired and want to build more.

We would not have this section done without their support, expertise and a willingness to have DPW step in when we needed help with heavy equipment. In late August town administrator Jim Bingham informed us the town would put in an application for Transportation Alternative funds to develop a section of the trail from downtown to Exit 9. This is one of the two largest projects in the entire vision and shows real commitment from the town.
